

## <u>Literacy/Topic - Julia Donaldson Stories</u>

Last week we read the story of The bad tempered Ladybird. This week we are going to look at the story of "The Snail and the Whale by Julia Donaldson

How are snails and whales different? How are they similar? Can you write a sentence describing what each animal is like?

Draw a picture or print out (if you can) a picture of the snail and the whale. What might each character say? Can you draw a speech bubble for each of them and write inside it what they are saying.



Look through the book and using your phonics, make a list of all the different animals you can find. Can you think of some words to describe the animals?

Which place in the story would you like to live in or visit? Mountains/Arctic/Ocean Imagine you are there. Tell a grown up what it's like. What can you see? Who else is there? How do you feel?
